Respectful Behaviours within the School Community Policy

The Department of Education has issued a new policy, which we have adopted at APPS. This sets out the responsibility that we all have to build a positive school community. Everyone in our school community – students, staff and parents – has the right to feel safe. All adult members of our community have a shared responsibility to model positive behaviour for our students, communicate politely and behave respectfully towards each other. There is a copy of the policy below and we will put the policy on our website.

No Parking Zones

The roads around our school can become very congested at drop off and pick up times. Please be careful not to park in no standing or no

parking zones. Not only is it unsafe, but we have had parking inspectors around lately and members of our community have been fined.

We can't do it without you!

At APPS, we are so lucky to have a wonderful parent community to support our children. If you have always wanted to be involved, but not quite sure where to start, please contact the office. There are lots of ways to help our school – even if you have limited time.

Professional Practice Days (PPD) - Repeat

For Semester Two, the Department of Education has allowed schools to hold each teacher's allocated professional practice day on the same day for all staff. This is to enable the most effective and efficient use of this day. As a result, School Council has approved **Monday 21st November** as a common Professional Practice Day (PPD). This means students will not be required at school on this day. Our final curriculum day (passed by School Council earlier in the year) **Wednesday 2nd November**. Students will not be required at school.

Mobile Phones - reminder - Repeat

As per the current Ministerial Order, students are NOT permitted to have a mobile phone at school. If phones are deemed necessary by parents for travel to and from school, they must be stored at the office on arrival and can be collected from the office at the end of the school day. Students will have privileges removed if they refused to surrender their phone. Rapid Antigen Tests - Repeat

Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs) will continue to be

available from school. The ongoing supply of RATs to families in our school will ensure that parents and carers will have them should they need them if their child is a household contact or has symptoms. Should you require more RATs, please do not hesitate to contact the office.

Face Masks - Repeat

The Victorian Department of Health strongly recommends that face masks are worn in indoor settings. As a result, the Department of Education is asking all students, aged eight and over, and all staff in schools across Victoria to wear masks in class from now until the end of winter. We all appreciate how important it is for students to be back at school. This action will help make sure as many students and staff as possible are protected from COVID and other winter illnesses.

Reporting Cases - Repeat

Family members are asked to continue reporting positive COVID-19 cases to both the Department of Health and to Ainslie Parklands Primary School. Positive cases are now required to isolate for five days. You must also let the school know if your child is a close contact. Students who are close contacts and want to attend school should still return 5 negative RATs (school days) over 7 days and wear a face mask whilst indoors if they are aged 8 years or over.

Students and visitors should continue to stay home if they are unwell, even if they test negative on a RAT.

New & Updated Policies on our Website -Repeat

From 1st July 2022, a new set of Child Safe Standards came into force across Australia.

These standards have been adjusted to mostly reflect a national standard (rather than individual state standards) and are designed to ensure that we are all doing everything we can to keep our young people safe from harm. These standards impact the way we do many things at school (for example, requirements for visitors on site, requirements around camps and excursions, etc.), and consequently, many of our policies have been adjusted.

PURPOSE

This policy outlines the shared roles of parents, carers and school staff in creating a positive environment for learning. There are also other policies that set out clear standards of behaviours that are specific to school staff and students.

When parents/carers and school staff work together as one team, our students do better. Victorian Government schools, including Ainslie Parklands Primary School (APPS) want to work with parents and carers to achieve this.

The expected standards of behaviours apply to different school settings. This includes at school events, camps, excursions, outdoor activities, online learning and other places online related to APPS and other schools.

BUILDING A POSITIVE RELATIONSHIP WITH YOUR SCHOOL

Parents/carers and school staff have a relationship that can last many years. This is an opportunity to work together to create a positive relationship in the best interests of the child.

When this relationship is built on respect and trust, students learn better and feel like they belong in the school. The foundation of a good collaborative relationship is based on:

- open and honest communication
- trust and respect
- working together

fair and reasonable expectations by all.

Respect - Responsibility - Resilience

School staff in Victorian Government schools have to follow the Respectful Workplaces Policy to build and maintain a respectful workplace, including:

- treating each other with respect and consideration
- being inclusive, valuing others and accepting their differences
- recognising the efforts and achievements of others
- considering our impact on others
- calling out and addressing behaviour that can lead to bullying, harassment and discrimination.

Parents/carers can create a positive environment for learning and work by:

- modelling positive behaviour to their child/children and to the APPS community .
- communicating politely and respectfully with all members of the APPS community
- working with the school to achieve the best outcomes for their child/children
- communicating constructively with the school
- making use of the expected processes and protocols when raising concerns
- following the school's processes for communication with staff and making complaints
- treating all school staff, students, and other members of the APPS community with respect.

By treating everyone with respect, parents/carers and schools can make sure students feel supported and cared for.

RESPECTFULLY RAISING COMPLAINTS AT YOUR SCHOOL

The Department supports your right to make a complaint and provides a Parent Complaints Policy to help you do this. Complaints from parents and carers help the school community by providing feedback to improve how a school operates.

APPS welcomes complaints from parents and carers if they are communicated in a respectful and constructive way. They may ask that concerns be communicated in writing.

The Family Engagement in Learning page shows parents and carers how they can best talk to schools to provide feedback or complaints. Each school is different in how they prefer to talk to you - please refer to APPS's communication guidance.

You can have a support person to help you at any time, who can talk to the school on your behalf or help you understand APPS policies. They can be a family member, a friend, a community member or a person from a support service.

You can also ask APPS for an interpreter or translator to help communicate with the school, as per the Interpreting and Translation Services Policy.

UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOURS AND CONSEQUENCES

Schools are positive places of learning where everyone has a right to a safe and healthy learning environment. Schools are also workplaces, and school staff deserve to work in an environment where they don't feel threatened or unsafe.

When a small number of parents and carers behave unacceptably towards a staff member or another member of the school community, this can affect their health, safety and wellbeing. The impact can also be felt by the wider school community.

Unacceptable or unreasonable behaviours include, but are not limited to:

- . being violent or threatening violence of any kind, including being physically intimidating, aggressive hand gestures or invading another person's personal space
- · speaking or behaving in a rude, aggressive or threatening way, either in person, via email, social media, or over the telephone
- sending demanding, rude, confronting or threatening letters, emails or text messages
- discriminatory or derogatory comments
- the use of social media or public forums to make inappropriate or threatening remarks about the school, staff or students.

If a parent or carer behaves in an unacceptable way, the school principal may contact them to talk about this further and there may be consequences.

Unacceptable or unreasonable behaviour may be escalated to the Department, where it will be assessed and managed by:

- requesting that the parties attend a mediation or counselling sessions .
- requesting all communications be in writing
- written warnings
- conditions of entry to school grounds or school activities .
- exclusion from school grounds or attendance at school activities
- reports to Victoria Police
- legal action.

Thunderstorm asthma — be prepared this pollen season

Grass pollen season, which runs from October to December each year, brings an increase in asthma and hay fever symptoms. It also increases the risk of thunderstorm asthma. For people with asthma or hay fever, especially those who experience wheezing or coughing with their hay fever, thunderstorm asthma can be sudden, serious and even life threatening.

Ainslie Parklands Primary School will implement a range of measures to keep our school community safe when the risk of thunderstorm asthma increases.

Many of our staff are trained in asthma first aid, and we will monitor the VicEmergency app to receive thunderstorm warnings, and, where appropriate, keep students indoors when weather forecasts identify greater level of risk.

How you can prepare

During pollen season, there are some things you can do to prepare and protect yourself and your family:

• *If your child has ever had asthma*: talk to your doctor about what you can do to help protect your child from the risk of thunderstorm asthma, including updating your asthma action plan. Taking an asthma preventer properly and regularly is key to preventing asthma, including thunderstorm asthma.

· *If your child has hay fever*: see your pharmacist or doctor for a hay fever treatment plan and check if you should have an asthma reliever puffer. These are available from a pharmacy without a prescription.

• *If your child has hay fever and experiences wheezing and coughing*: it is important to make sure they don't also have asthma. Speak to your doctor about an asthma action plan.

 \cdot Where possible, avoid being outside during thunderstorms from October to December, especially during the wind gusts that come before the storm. Go inside and close your doors and windows. If you have your air conditioning on, turn it to 'recirculate'.

Protect yourself this pollen season – managing asthma and allergies matters.

Remain vigilant for COVID-19

It is important for students to manage any hay fever or asthma symptoms, as these conditions can produce symptoms such as fever, chills, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, runny nose, and loss or change to sense of smell or taste, which are similar to COVID-19 symptoms.

If your child experiences these symptoms in different or worse ways to their usual hay fever or asthma symptoms, medical advice should be sought.





FROM THE YEAR 6 STUDIO










FROM THE ART STUDIO
