Somers Camp 2025 for Year 5 & 6 students

Every two years our school is offered a limited number of places at the Department Education of and Training's Somers School Camp. This year our allotted time is from 06/05/25until the 14/05/25. It is a nine day commitment and as such, please only provide an expression of interest if children can attend without concerns of sports or family commitments. Sunday is a day when visitors can attend from 12.00 - 2.30pm and again children must be able to return to their camp activities willingly after their family leaves.

Children who gain selection from our school will join with 160 Grade 5 and 6 children from our school district in this very special Outdoor Education and Personal Development program.

The camp has both indoor and outdoor activities all run by specialist permanent teaching staff with the assistance of nine local teachers who will accompany the children to and from the camp.

The activities are mainly physical and outdoor and include High and Low Ropes Courses, Boating, Rock Climbing, Challenge Abseiling, Swing Initiative Activities which require a reasonable level of physical fitness. All children are also required to take part in the following activities: Archery, Art, Drama, Environmental Studies, Bush Cooking, Orienteering, Bike Education, Flying Fox, Bush Dancing, Disco Night, Singing and Diary Writing. Separate boys and girls living arrangements are provided but all activities are done in mixed groups.

The fee for the camp is \$350.00 and must be paid in full before children can attend. The fee includes transport, accommodation, meals and pocket money.

This is a great camp and provides children with the opportunity to accept challenges, improve their self esteem, meet and mix with others from our local area, have fun and learn at the same time. We have had children from APPS attend this camp previously.

Thunderstorm asthma – be prepared this pollen season

Grass pollen season, which typically runs from October to December each year in Victoria, brings an increase in asthma and hay fever symptoms. It also increases the risk of thunderstorm asthma. For people with asthma or hay fever, especially those who experience wheezing or coughing with their hay fever, thunderstorm asthma can be sudden, serious and even life threatening.

APPS will implement a range of measures to keep our school community safe as the risk of thunderstorm asthma increases.

Many of our staff are trained in asthma first aid, and we will monitor the VicEmergency app to receive thunderstorm warnings, and, where appropriate, keep students indoors when weather forecasts identify greater risk.

During the season, there are some things you can do to prepare and protect yourself and your family:

- If your child has ever had asthma, talk to your doctor about what you can do to help protect them from the risk of thunderstorm asthma pollen this season, including updating your asthma action plan. preventer Taking an asthma properly and regularly is key to preventing asthma, including thunderstorm asthma.
- If your child has hay fever, see your pharmacist or doctor for a hay fever treatment plan and check if you should have an asthma reliever puffer.

- If your child has hay fever and experiences wheezing and coughing, it is important to make sure they don't also have asthma. Speak to your doctor about an asthma action plan.
- Where possible, avoid being outside during thunderstorms from October to December, especially during the wind gusts that come before the storm. Go inside and close your doors and windows. If you have your air conditioning on, turn it to 'recirculate'.

Protect yourself this pollen season – managing asthma and allergies matters.

The World Teachers day theme, "Hats Off to Teachers", is a great way for the nation to show its appreciation for the expertise, dedication, creativity, and support all teachers provide to our young learners.



Student Attitude to School Survey

Every year, students in Years 4, 5 & 6

Every year, students in Years 4, 5 & 6 complete this survey, administered by the Department of Education. It gives information about the students' views and connection to school.

This year's results reflect that staff at APPS takes on feedback from our community, and in particular, value students' voice, showing an upward trend in positive results across almost every domain in the survey.

The "stimulated learning" domain, which includes statements such as "my teacher makes learning fun" or "my teacher makes the work we do in class interesting" (which students then rank) has shown huge growth, from last year's 61% positive to 84%, positive, well exceeding all comparitve measures.

In the area of motivation and interest for students, including statements such as "I am learning things that really interest me", students recorded an 82% positive response, which is again, above all comparative measures and an increase in last year's data.

Where students were asked if teachers believed that they could do well at school, 96% of students reported that their teachers believe this. Students feel supported in their learning.

While these are all great results, there is still work to do. We will continue to listen to feedback from students and parents, and strengthen our practices around developing resilience in students and strengthening their confidence to seek help when needed.

Building Works delay

Sustainability News

New Bins

Why is using the right bin is important? Well you can help the environment by putting your rubbish in the right bin. For example: putting a banana peel in the compost is the right bin for food scraps. Contamination can result in quality recyclables and green waste being sent to landfill.

APPS's New Bin System

We have created a new bin system. We now have container deposit scheme bins which we will be using the money we make from the containers (like juice boxes) for that year's year six graduation. The other bins will have signs indicating what rubbish goes in each bin.

- Container deposit scheme bins can take appropriate drink containers like plastic bottles and juice boxes.
- In compost we can put fruit scraps and uneaten bread, chips, cake, and biscuits, you can't put tea bags, tissues, meat, dairy, or plastic.
- In the paper recycling bin, you can put paper and carboard but not tissues and greasy cardboard.
- In the landfill you can put any soft plastic and most things that don't go in the other bins.
- In the commingled recycling you can put hard plastic, foil in a ball, no food scraps or chip packets/soft plastic.

In the coming months, the Department of Education will send you 2 email communications for each of your children enrolled in Victorian government schools.

By Friday 18 October 2024, please ensure that your child's 2025 enrolment is completed and that your contact information is up to date.

The 2 emails from the Department of Education will:

- 1. Confirm your email address between mid-October and late-November.
- 2. Provide you with your unique \$400 School Saving Bonus code by the end of November.

From Foundation, Level 1 & 2

The F-2 team took full advantage of the beautiful spring weather this week as we took our learning outside. Our Inquiry unit this term is the STEM focus of physical science. We have been exploring the forces of push and pull. After testing their flying paper objects inside, students took them out to the oval to see how the different conditions would affect them.

Foundations exploration of the recent sunshine took the form of shadow drawings and paintings. They applied concentration and attention to detail as they traced the shadows cast by plants and objects.











From Year 3

It has been a busy start to Term 4 for the Grade 3's, as we had Camp at The Briars last week and a full week of work this week.

In English we did Camp recounts using a photo from camp as our prompt and these are displayed just outside our classroom door. This week the children have worked well on creating a draft and published copy of a persuasive text titled-"Should we have a pet in our class?".

In Numeracy we have worked on Division using pictures of food arranged in rows and columns to determine possible ways of showing this. In Reading we have focussed on finding conjunctions, adjectives and verbs in a text and answered comprehension questions about how popular Bluey is in America.

For Wellbeing we created a mind map showing the various ways we were grateful for our camp experience.

We have begun planning and drafting our own written persuasives on a variety of student chosen topics. Look out for the published pieces on Seesaw soon!






BEFORE DONATING:

Ensure toys are in good condition (gently used, no missing or broken parts).

Clean toys thoroughly before donating.

Ensure toys meet current safety standards (no sharp edges, choking hazards, or dangerous components). Label toys with appropriate age range if possible.

BATTERY-POWERED TOYS:

If donating battery-operated toys, include working batteries or label if batteries are not included. GAME/PUZZLE COMPLETENESS:

Ensure board games or puzzles have all pieces and instructions (if applicable).

SOFT TOYS:

Soft toys should be clean and odour-free (consider washing them before donating).

WHAT TO DONATE:

Action Figures/Dolls (good condition)
Educational Toys (building blocks, learning tools)
Board Games/Puzzles (complete sets)
Outdoor Toys (balls, jump ropes, etc.)
Art Supplies/Creative Kits (unused or barely used)
Vehicles (toy cars, trucks, trains, etc.)
Electronic Toys (functional)

WHAT NOT TO DONATE:

Broken or Damaged Toys
Toys with Missing Pieces
